Welcome to the SOPA

The purpose of the "Schedule of Proposed Environmental Actions" (SOPA) is to provide you with an overview of environmental analyses currently in progress or recently completed in Los Padres National Forest pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). We hope that this information will help you become involved early in the decision-making process for those projects which might interest or affect you.

The SOPA is issued quarterly (January, April, July, October). Projects are listed by county and by analysis category. Each description includes a brief explanation and location of the project, current status, the estimated decision date, and the name of the project leader. **Analyses Being Scoped** - new projects for which public input is being or is about to be solicited. **Analyses Completed** - projects that have been categorically excluded from documentation in an Environmental Assessment (EA) or Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) and which have culminated in the preparation of a Decision Memo (DM) as required by Chapter 31.3, FSH 1909.15. **Analyses Documented** - recently completed EA's and EIS's for which a Decision Notice (DN) has been issued. **Analyses in Progress** - projects currently under analysis.

FORESTWIDE

Analyses Being Scoped None.

Analyses in Progress

Oil and Gas Leasing Analysis

Forestwide analysis to identify lands which should or should not be made available for oil and gas leasing. The decisions made as a result of this

analysis will not result in on-the-ground activities. Any exploration, drilling or field development which might be proposed following this study would require further analysis and separate site-specific decisions. The DEIS is expected to be distributed for public review by early November 2001. The DEIS will be available at local Forest Service offices, libraries and on the forest website. MONTEREY COUNTY

Analyses Being Scoped

Monterey Defensible Fuel Profile Zones

Proposal to manage fuels using prescribed fire and mechanical treatments adjacent to roads and campgrounds. The proposal also includes maintenance of existing fire lines and safety zones by planting of native grasses and trees. The purpose of this project is to create safety zones to protect Forest users and enhance fire suppression capability. The Monterey DFPZ project consists of ten units outside of wilderness areas including the following: three units within the Arroyo Seco Gorge; one unit in Reliz Canyon; one unit the Piney Creek area; one unit at Skinner Ridge and one unit at Manuel Peak. The remaining areas are along Tassajara Road, Cone Peak Road, Nacimiento-Fergusson Road and Coast Ridge Road. Public scoping will begin in July 2001. Estimated decision date: Winter 2002. Hunting Guide and Outfitter/Guide SUP

Proposal to conduct guided hunting trips using stock and camping equipment on forest lands within the Ventana and Silver Peak wildernesses. Estimated decision date: September 2002. Contact Manuel Madrigal, Recreation Officer, MRD.

Coast Highway Management Plan (CHMP)

Proposal to authorize disposal of landslide material that falls onto Highway 1 along the south Big Sur Coast at two sites on National Forest System lands

mine is located on the Mount Pinos Ranger District in T8N, R20W, Sec 29, SBBM. The White Elephant abandoned mine is located approximately one mile inside the San Rafael Wilderness. Estimated decision date: 2002. Contact: Dennis Cooper, Lands and Minerals Officer, SLRD.

Camino Cielo Defensible Fuel Profile Zone

Proposal to treat standing chaparral in a 300 foot wide band for a distance of approximately 40 miles along the West and East Camino Cielo Roads from Refugio Road east to Divide Peak. T4N, R25W; T5N, R24-32W, SBBM. Some of the DFPZ has been in existence since the 1970's. The purpose of the project is to reconstruct/restore the existing DFPZ to reduce the threat of catastrophic wildfire in the urban interface with Goleta, Santa Barbara and Montecito. The DFPZ will be designed to maintain a diversity of vegetation age, size and density with mosaic patterns of unburned islands within the DFPZ perimeter. This will result in irregular shapes and spotty patterns in the brush to maintain a natural appearance over time. The proposed work would be accomplished using a combination of the following methods: cutting the brush and stacking it by hand; mechanical brush crushing; chipping; pile burning and burning of standing brush using drip torches and a terratorch. Brookshire Prescribed Burn

Proposal to use management ignited prescribed fire to treat approximately 18,000 acres of standing chaparral vegetation to reduce the threat of catastrophic wildfire by reducing the fuel loading, and to restore watershed health. The project boundary lies to the east of Tepusquet Canyon along the national forest boundary, south of Madre peak, north of Barrel Springs Campground, and will run on the west side of the Sierra Madre Ridge Road from Madre Peak to Miranda Pines Campground in the Sisquoc and Cuyama watersheds. T23N, R18E, Sec 31, 32; T11N, R17E, Sec 4-10, 16-21, 29, 30; T11N, R18E, Sec 6; T12N, R17E, Sec 36; T11N, R17E, Sec 1, 11-15, 22-36; T10N, R17E, Sec 1-12, 14-18, 20-22, 27, 28, SBBM. NACO West Outfitter/Guide Permit

Proposal to renew the special use permit for NACO West to conduct guided horseback trail rides on Aliso, Lower Oso, Upper Oso Trail loop, Arroyo Burro Trail, and Arroyo Burro Road, Mateus and River Trail loop. Estimated decision date: Winter 2002. Contact: Jeff Bensen, Recreation Forester, SBRD.

Santa Ynez River Ford

Proposal to reconstruct the ford located just past the county-maintained Paradise Road on the Forest Service-maintained river road, adjacent to the Lower Oso Day Use Area. The ford was partially demolished by El Nino storms and has since been shored up with gravel to allow recreationists access to the Lower Santa Ynez Recreation Area. The

proposed action is to reconstruct the ford and relocate it slightly (approximately 150 feet) upstream in order to reduce the length (and cost) of the river crossing and improve public safety by increasing sight distance. Riverside/White Rock Recreation Facilities

Proposal to construct recreation and interpretive facilities along Paradise Road in the Manzanita and Cabin Lane areas, and west of the White Rock Picnic Area, in the Lower Santa Ynez Recreation Area. T5N, R28W, Sec 3, SBBM. Estimated decision date: Summer 2002. Contact: Jeff Bensen, Recreation Forester, SBRD.

Happy Canyon Allotment

Proposal to analyze grazing on the Happy Canyon Allotment on the Santa Barbara Ranger District. Includes 73 cow/calf pairs and 3 bulls from March 1 to February 28. T7N, R29W, SBBM. Contact: Gary Montgomery, Range Specialist, SLRD.

De Vault, Durbiano, Venadito Livestock Area

Proposal to analyze grazing on three small special use pastures in order to re-issue grazing permits. Includes DeVaul for 10 yearling cattle from March 1 to July 30; Durbiano for 5 horses from January 1 to December 31; and Venadito for 5 cow/calf pairs from February 15 to June 30. KERN COUNTY

Analyses Being Scoped

Dwarf Mistletoe Suppression Treatment

Proposal to treat Jeffrey pine stands infected with dwarf mistletoe adjacent to Pine Mountain Club, and assist Pine Mountain Club Property Owners Association in suppressing and stopping the spread of the disease. Estimated decision date: Spring 2002. Contact: John Kelly, Forester, MPRD.

Pacific Bell Cable Replacement

Proposal by Pacific Bell to replace existing phone lines with digital cable lines across approximately 7 miles of National Forest System lands along Cuddy Valley Road and Mil Potrero Road. Project would involve trenching, in the existing road prism where possible. Estimated decision date: January 2002. Contact: Loreigh Brannan, Special Use Administrator, MPRD.

Communication Sites and Access Roads

American Towers Inc. has purchased the building and tower structure at the top of Mount Abel (Cerro Noroeste) in T9N, R22W, Sec 26, SBBM. The proponent proposes to operate the existing facility under a new Communication Site Lease Agreement. No new construction of additional structures will be authorized. Estimated decision date: unknown. Contact: Loreigh Brannan, Special Use Administrator, MPRD.

Off-Highway Vehicle System Maintenance

In a Decision Notice signed on July 11, 2001, District Ranger Rich Phelps approved a proposal to performance maintenance on the following OHV routes: East Frazier, Tejon, Whata, Gold Hill, Snowy, West Tecuya, Tecuya Ridge and Cold Springs trails; Ballinger trails #10,13,14, 34,50,51,52,53,54; Salt Creek, Cherry Creek, Pleito Creek, West Frazier Mine, West Frazier Tie, Lockwood; Miller Jeep and O'Neil Peak 4-wheel drive routes. In addition, rehabilitation is approved on an old mining road near O'Neil Peak. Contact: Don Trammell, Recreation Officer, MPRD.

Analyses in Progress

Frazier Park Defensible Fuel Profile Zone

Proposal to improve an existing DFPZ to provide defensible space for homes in the town of Frazier Park. The DFPZ was constructed originally as a fuelbreak in the early 1970's and is located north of Frazier Park, T9N, R19W, Sec 31 and T9N, R20W, Sec 25 and 26, SBBM. The proposed DFPZ maintenance project is designed to incorporate a mosaic vegetation pattern averaging 150 feet wide and three miles long to help maintain a natural appearance. Work would be accomplished in the fall of 2001. The brush would be cut by hand and piled. Excess brush piles and standing sage, buckwheat and rabbitbrush within the DFPZ boundary would be burned using hand-carried drip torches. The piles would be burned during the late fall of 2001 or winter of 2002, and the standing brush would be burned in the spring of 2002. Estimated decision date: Fall 2001. Pine Mtn Club Defensible Fuel Profile Zone

Proposal to continue construction of a shaded DFPZ on National Forest land at the eastern boundary of the community of Pine Mountain Club in cooperation with Kern County Fire Department. T9N, R22W, Sec 21 and 22, SBBM. The vegetation type is pinyon and Jeffrey pine with inter-mixed canyon live oak and scrub oak. The DFPZ would be approximately 0.75 mile long by 100 feet wide and would provide defensible space for homes in Pine Mountain Club. The existing condition is approximately 60 to 70 percent canopy cover and the desired condition is to reduce the canopy cover to 30 to 40 percent. The DFPZ will be designed to resemble a park-like setting. The work will be accomplished by cutting, stacking and burning the excess brush piles using hand-carried drip torches. The proposed timeframe for cutting the brush would be in the fall of 2001. The pile burning would occur in the fall of 2001 or winter of 2002. Estimated decision date: Fall 2001. Special Use Permit for Organization Camp

Proposal to renew a permit to continue operating a year-round organizational camp on national forest

land west of Pinyon Pines at the base of Mt. Pinos. The site is currently occupied by the El Camino Pines/Frontier Pines Camp and is located along Frontier Road, 0.5 mile southwest of the intersection of Mt. Pinos Hwy and Mil Potrero Hwy. T9N, R21W, Sec 26, SBBM. The applicant proposes to upgrade the facility to make it fully accessible to persons with disabilities through minor modifications to existing buildings. A limited number of new buildings would be constructed and some existing structures would be relocated to more clustered locations. The applicant proposes to increase the capacity of the camp from approximately 140 people to approximately 200 people. Estimated decision date: unknown. VENTURA COUNTY

Analyses Being Scoped

Ojai Community Defense Zone

Proposal to reduce hazardous fuels and improve watershed health in the Ojai area, and provide protection and defensible space for firefighters and public safety in the event of a wildfire. The Ojai Community Defense Zone Project will consist of various methods of fuel reduction including creation of defensible fuel profile zones (DFPZ), broadcast burning, mechanical treatment, hand cutting and piling, and pile burning. The project covers approximately 40,000 acres and will be implemented over several years. The project will be a cooperative effort with Ventura County Fire Protection District and the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection. T4N, R21W, Sec 6; T5N, R21W, Sec 19, 20, 29, 30, 31, 32; T4N, R22W, Sec 1 and 2; T5N, R22W, Sec 15-36; T4N, R23W, Sec 5, 6 and 7; T5N, R24W, Sec 31-36; T4N, R24W, Sec 1-12, 14-22, 27-30, SBBM. Bighorn Sheep Prescribed Burn

Proposal to use management ignited prescribed fire to treat approximately 22,640 acres of standing chaparral vegetation to reduce hazardous fuel loading. In addition, the proposal would rejuvenate forbs and brush for wildlife, provide browseway corridors for bighorn sheep, provide a buffer for the Sespe Wilderness and Condor Sanctuary, and reduce the threat of negative impacts from a high intensity fire in the Sespe and Santa Clara watersheds. The treatment would produce mosaic vegetation patterns with varied age, size and density that maintain a natural appearance over time. The project boundary lies south of the MPRD line, west of Cobblestone Mountain and Ant Campground, north of Ant and Alder Creek Campgrounds and Ten Sycamore Flat, and east of Sycamore Canyon. Alamo Prescribed Burn

Proposal to use management ignited prescribed fire to treat approximately 12,700 acres of standing chaparral vegetation and mixed conifer forest in the Piru and Alamo watersheds to reduce the threat of a catastrophic stand-replacing fire by reducing hazardous fuel loading. In addition, the project will improve forest health, rejuvenate forbs and brush for wildlife and provide a buffer for the nearby Sespe Wilderness and Condor Sanctuary. The project boundary lies to the east of forest road 8N12 from Lockwood Flat to Dutchman Campground, and east of forest road 8N01 from Dutchman CG to the intersection of road 6N10, north of 6N10 from the intersection with 8N01 to trail 19W05, west of 19W05 from the intersection of 8N01 to trail 19W04, west of 19W04 from the intersection of 19W05 to the intersection of Piru and Smith Fork, south of Piru from Smith Fork to 8N01, and south of trail 20W07 from the intersection of 8N01 to the intersection of 8N12. T7N, R20W, Sec 13-16, 20-29, 33-36; T6N, R20W, Sec 1-4, T7N, R19W, Sec 14-23 and 27-33; T6N, R19W, Sec 4-6, SBBM. Estimated decision date: September 2002. Casitas Watershed Hazardous Fuels

Proposal to improve the protection of the Casitas Watershed from wildfires by enhancing and improving existing fuelbreaks that were constructed in the 1970's and by reducing the existing hazardous fuels. The proposed actions include reconstruction and restoration of the existing fuelbreaks (also known as Defensible Fuel Profile Zones, DFPZ) and the use of prescribed fire to reduce hazardous fuels. The proposed fuelbreak maintenance project is designed to incorporate a mosaic vegetation pattern averaging 300 feet wide and approximately 12 miles long (Laguna, Chismahoo-Coyote, Santa Ana). The end result will incorporate a diversity of vegetation age class, size and density with mosaic patterns of unburned islands within the perimeter. The result will be a natural appearing feature of irregular shapes and patterns in the brush designed to naturally complement the existing landscape. The proposed work would be accomplished using a combination of the following methods: cutting the brush and stacking it by hand; mechanical brush crushing; chipping; pile burning and burning of standing brush using hand-carried drip torches and/or terratorches. Piru Allotments

Proposal to analyze grazing on the Piru, Temescal and Potholes allotments on the Ojai Ranger District. Includes 30 cow/calf pairs on the Piru/Potholes allotment and 30 cow/calf pairs on the Temescal allotment. T5N, R18W, SBBM. Estimated decision date: Spring 2002. Off-Highway Vehicle System Maintenance

In a Decision Notice signed on July 11, 2001, District Ranger Rich Phelps approved a proposal to performance maintenance on the following OHV routes: East Frazier, Tejon, Whata, Gold Hill, Snowy, West Tecuya, Tecuya Ridge and Cold Springs trails; Ballinger trails #10,13,14, 34,50,51,52,53,54; Salt Creek, Cherry Creek, Pleito Creek, West Frazier Mine, West Frazier Tie, Lockwood; Miller Jeep and O'Neil Peak 4-wheel drive routes. Analyses in Progress

Rice-Wills Prescribed Burn

Proposal to conduct a 2660 acre prescribed burn project in cooperation with Ventura County Fire Department, the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection and the Ventura County Air Pollution Control District. The project is located north of Rancho Matilija and south of Wills Canyon in T4N, R23W, Sec 5-7, SBBM. Approximately 1,040 acres are on National Forest land and approximately 1,620 acres are on private land. The purpose of the project is to use prescribed fire to lower the risk of a large destructive wildfire by reducing fuel loading. It is an extension of ongoing cooperative projects in the Ojai frontcountry. A combination of pile and broadcast burning will be utilized using hand-carried drip torches, terratorches and a heli-torch. The objective is to remove 60-70% of the standing fuels in a manner resembling a low to medium intensity, naturally occurring backing fire. Estimated decision date: November 2001. Gold Hill OHV Trail

Proposal to construct an off-highway vehicle trail to provide an alternate OHV route between the Hungry Valley State Vehicular Recreation Area and the MPRD's eastside OHV trail system. T7N, R19W, Sec 4-8 and 18, SBBM. Objective is to remove OHV use on Gold Hill Road to improve public safety while maintaining existing recreation opportunities. Approximately 5 miles of trail would be constructed. Estimated decision date: Fall 2001. Contact: Don Trammell, Recreation Officer, MPRD.

Sespe Fire Management Plan

Proposal to develop a fire management plan for national forest lands within the Sespe watershed. The plan would allow prescribed natural fire (lightning) to fulfill its natural ecological role, define management-ignited prescribed burn units, and allow for control, contain and confine fire tactics to be implemented within the watershed. Ojai Valley Gun Club

Proposal to renew the existing special use permit for the facilities in Rose Valley. T5N, R22W, Sec 4, SBBM. Estimated decision date: unknown. Contact: Charlie Robinson, Recreation Officer, ORD.

Rose Valley Environmental Education Center

Proposal to issue a permit for the use of the Rose Valley facility. Contact: John Bridgwater, District Ranger, ORD.
